She supports many charitable causes, and felt drawn to WIJABA due to her humble beginnings.

"It's an honor and a privilege to join the list of such luminous and prolific people for a peerless and epic concept like '*The World Is Just a Book Away'*. For me it holds tremendous significance, because as a child I had very humble beginnings. I had no more than 4 dresses, no toys, no cycles, no TVs but only borrowed books from my rich friends or libraries at my school. It helped my imagination take wing and I vicariously traveled and enjoyed the world and lived magnificent moments in my mind. Today, in spite of being an entertainer with material wealth, I don't have a TV in my room but only books. I believe the best gift to have and give is the gift to read," says Raageshwari.

National Literacy Day is India is celebrated on November 11, on the birthday of Maulana Abul Kalam Azad, the first Education Minister of Independent India. Abul Kalam was a renowned scholar, poet, freedom fighter, and a staunch Gandhian, and he felt that the condition of Indian society cannot be uplifted without education. For his invaluable contribution to the nation, Maulana Abul Kalam Azad was posthumously awarded India's highest civilian honor, Bharat Ratna in 1992.

"Reading is knowledge and knowledge is power," says Raageshwari. "It enlightens and awakens you emotionally, mentally and spiritually. With a concept as noble as this I feel we are empowering our little children and their future and reinforcing their true potential."

Raageshwari's song "Duniya" will be played during the opening of the library, and a plaque with her photo will be posted in the library.
